Presenter: Peter H. Wood, US History Professor at Duke & CU



Peter H. Wood is the author of Black Majority; Strange New Land: Africans in Colonial America; and Near Andersonville: Winslow Homer's Civil War. He is the co-author of a widely used U.S. History survey text entitled Created Equal. In 2011, Professor Wood received the Asher Distinguished Teaching Award of the American Historical Association. He now lives in Longmont, Colorado, with his wife, the Pulitzer-Prize winning historian Elizabeth Fenn.
